

Orienting Data for Isaiah (How to Read the Bible Book By Book, Fee & Stuart)

Content: Yahweh's sovereign majesty and redemptive love, revealed in his dealings with his chosen people the Israelites, who are destined for both judgment and salvation, in which the nations will also be included

Prophet: Isaiah of Jerusalem, name means, "The Lord saves"

Date of prophetic activity: from about 740 to 687 B.C.

Overview:

Cited by the New Testament more than any other book except Psalms;

Chapter 1–39 deal primarily with Jerusalem during the period of the Assyrian threat with the future threat of exile in Babylon;

Chapters 40–66 focus on the future of Israel and Jerusalem toward the end of the Babylonian captivity and beyond

Theological Passions of Isaiah:

- 1) Yahweh as the "Holy One of Israel"
- 2) Israel as Yahweh's "Holy People"
- 3) Zion (Jerusalem) as God's "holy city" and "holy mountain"
- 4) The Inclusion of the nations (Gentiles) in his people
